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Pectus Excavatum Travel Letter

To Whom It May Concern,

Pectus excavatum is a chest wall abnormality when the sternum and chest is sunken into the chest causing a depression or caved in appearance. Surgery was completed with a minimally invasive repair of pectus excavatum (chest wall abnormality) at Children's Mercy Hospital. This surgery involves the placement of a stainless-steel bar under the sternum that extends across the chest from the left side to the right side and will stay in place for approximately 3 years until it is surgically removed. This is unlikely to set off sensor type alarms, however, if it should, this letter will explain the reason for any alarm activity around the area of the chest.
